The **National Association of Women Artists** was founded in NYC in 1889 by five artists in order to provide more opportunities to women artists to exhibit and network in a male-dominated industry. Its mission is to elevate the purpose, quality, and visibility of our best female artists. All members are juried into the organization. Over the last 130 years, members invited

into the organization have included notable artists: Mary Cassatt, Georgia O'Keefe, Rosa Bonheur, Gertrude Vanderbilt Whitney, Judith Pfaff, Faith Ringgold, Louise Nevelson, Audrey Flack, Dorothy Dehner, and Judy Chicago. Its members have made other significant achievements, such as the establishment of the Whitney Museum in NYC and the Brookgreen Gardens in South Carolina. In 1995, Liana Moonie founded the Florida Chapter.

Today, NAWA (and the Florida Chapter) remains a significant and vibrant organization for contemporary female and self-identified female artists across the nation.
